At the Tuesday, Dec. 3, meeting of the Wells County Commission, Johnny Lawson, sheriff's deputy of Bowman County, was appointed to the position of Wells County sheriff. Lawson will fill the unexpired term left by retiring Sheriff Curtis Pellett.

The commissioners interviewed six applicants for the position on Nov. 18. Two individuals from outside the region, Ward County Sheriff Steve Kukowski and Arnie Rummel, a BCI agent from Jamestown, assisted the five commissioners with the interviewing. Lawson was selected unanimously by the seven people.

Lawson began his law enforcement career with the Benson County Sheriff's Office in January, 2007. He has been in the position with Bowman County since October, 2008.

The commissioners appointed Lawson to fill the unexpired term which runs until Dec. 31, 2014. Randi Suckut, chairman of the Wells County Commissioners, said that Lawson will begin his duties on Jan. 8, 2014, or after the requirement of 30-days residency in the county has been met.


Regional DUI Task Force results

The Northeast Devils Lake Regional DUI Task Force parpated in the Regional DUI Task Force program. They made three driving under the influence arrests, one other alcohol-related citation, one felony violation, one seat belt citation, 14 speed citations, three driving while suspended citations, and 15 other arrests and traffic citations and made 52 enforcement contacts during the recent unified saturation patrol effort. This task force began October 1, 2010, to take significant steps toward reducing alcohol-related crashes and fatalities across the state.

In the Northeast Devils Lake Region, 11 law enforcement agencies participated in the first quarter of this program conducted in October. By working together to create high visibility enforcement, early results show a positive impact on deterring motorists from drinking and driving. These statistics emphasize the importance of enforcement and saturation patrols in protecting motorists on North Dakota's roadways.

Nearly 80 percent of all law enforcement agencies currently participate in the DUI Task Force across North Dakota. This program is intended to save lives by reducing alcohol-related fatalities and car crashes.

The Northeast Devils Lake DUI Task Force includes the following agencies: NDHP, Rolette, Wells, Pierce, Cavalier, and Benson County Sheriff's Departments, Rolla, Rugby, and Devils Lake Police Departments, Turtle Mountain, and Fort Totten.



Opdahls add feature to garden venture

For the last couple years, Kent and Angel Opdahl, who farm near Manfred, have kept busy with Opdahl Gardens where they sell bedding plants in the spring, and fruits and vegetables at farmers markets throughout the summer. The couple also dabbles in honey and other byproducts of bee production, as they have put the bees of 30 hives to work for them to provide earlier pollination of their gardens.

The Opdahls are excited about a new branch of their business for 2014, Community Supported Agriculture (CSA). CSAs are new to this area, but are common in many places with a close tie to agriculture.

"The purpose of our CSA is to establish a relationship with our customers that will assure them the availability of locally grown, wholesome food," said Angel. "The customer pays a membership that will buy credits that can be used for special orders or for day of sale purchases at the farmers markets. Memberships, purchased this time of year, provide us seed money that will help with the production costs for the coming season."

Membership starts at \$100 and more credits can be purchased in \$100 increments. A 10 percent incentive is given for every \$100 purchased. Angel explained, "When a customer purchases a \$100 membership, they received \$110 in credits that can be used

to buy our produce, bedding or vegetable plants, honey, juneberries, apples, canned goods or any other product produced by Opdahl Gardens."

The business also offers custom planting. This means that they will start special order

bedding or vegetable plants in their greenhouse for customers to pick up by mid May. "If someone wants 500 red petunias, we'll get them started and ready to transplant," said Angel.

Kent and Angel also raise longhorn

What's it like in outer space?

Students in Drake and Anamoose had a unique opportunity to experience space this week. Drake-Anamoose High School and Anamoose-Drake Elementary were stops on the route of a traveling planetarium exhibit called the Discover Dome. The dome is an inflatable, digital theater that shows a variety of educational films on stars, planets, dinosaurs, tornados, DNA, planet Earth and much more. Students enter the inflatable dome through a slit in the side. Once inside they can lay on the floor and the digital projector with a fish eye lense projects the film on the curved inner surface of the dome, creating a realistic experience of events in the film. The dome was at the high school in Drake on Dec. 3 and at the Elementary School in Anamoose on Dec. 4.

The Discovery Dome came to Drake and Anamose thanks to the efforts of Angie Bartholomay, Instructor of Sciences at Dakota College at Bottineau and Dakota College's Honors Science students. The exhibit is the brainchild of Dr. Patricia H. Reiff, Director of the Rice Space Institute at Rice University in

Houston, Texas. The project's aim is to increase earth and space science education and bring a planetarium experience to students who may otherwise not have such an opportunity. Bartholomay received a grant which allowed her to take the Discovery Dome to many schools in North Dakota. She says that over 2,000 students in north central North Dakota have seen a Discovery Dome program since the middle of October. She and her science students at Dakota College are surveying students at the schools they visit and collecting data on whether or not children have seen a planetarium before. She has found that about 94 percent of North Dakota students who've seen the Discovery Dome had not been to a planetarium. Bartholomay hopes that this data will allow her to make the dome an annual experience at area schools.

The project is partially funded by NASA and made possible by Dakota College at Bottineau, The North Dakota Space Grant Consortium at UND, and North Central Education Cooperative.

Hunter education class registration

To register for a course, students need to sign up at the Game and Fish Department's website, gf.nd.gov. Many classes will be added over the next several weeks, and the rest will be added throughout the year as they are finalized.

To register, click on the online services tab, and "online course enrollment" under the hunter education heading. Classes are listed by city, and can also be sorted by start date. To register for a class, click on "enroll" next to the specific class, and follow the simple instructions. Personal information is required.

Those who do not have access to the Internet and want to sign up for a class can call the hunter education program in Bismarck at (701) 328-6615.

Individuals interested in receiving a notice by email when each hunter education class is added can click on the "subscribe to news, email and text alerts" link found below the news section on the department's home page. Check the box labeled "hunter education class notification" under the education program updates.

State law requires anyone born after Dec. 31, 1961 to pass a certified hunter education course to hunt in the state. Hunter education is mandatory for youth who are turning 12 years old, and children can take the class at age 11.

Go nutty for nuts this holiday season

I enjoy baking around the holidays. In preparation for baking, I began looking at some family recipes the other day. I noted with a smile that most of the recipes listed on my yellowed and tattered family recipe cards included chopped nuts.

Turns out, we all may benefit healthwise from eating more

Researchers have linked eating nuts on a near-daily basis with living longer, according to a recent study published in the New England Journal of Medicine. The researchers used food intake data from 119,000 men and women durprofessionals who filled out food and lifestyle surveys every two to four years.

The "frequent nut eaters" reduced their risk of dying from heart disease by 29 percent, and they reduced their risk of dying from cancer by 11 percent. In fact, eating any type of nut (whether oil-roasted, dry roasted, salted or unsalted) appeared to have a positive effect on health.

Beside reducing their risk of chronic diseases, the people who ate more nuts also were slimmer than the people who ate fewer or

When reading about studies such as this, keep in mind that there are no "magic foods" that will erase the effects of a long-term poor diet, lack of exercise or a smoking habit. Aim for an overall healthful lifestyle and include some nuts as snacks or as part of

Nuts are fairly dense in calories, but a small handful will tame hunger very well. Nuts are and contain mainly unsaturated, heart-healthy fat. If you choose unsalted or lightly salted nuts, you are keeping your sodium intake under control, too.

If trying to manage your calories, keep the following in mind. Nut calories can add up fairly quickly, so substitute nuts for treats such as potato chips or candy bars. You might find that nuts than other foods because of their and consume within a week. protein, fiber and fat content.

Glazed Pecans 1 c. shelled pecans

1/4 c. granulated sugar 1/8 tsp. salt

Put pecans, sugar and salt into good sources of protein and fiber large nonstick skillet. Stir constantly over medium heat. Cook mixture until sugar melts and turns a rich, golden color. Transfer to a plate(s) with one layer per plate and let cool slightly.

Tips: If making a large batch, use more than one large nonstick skillet to more evenly coat all pecans. Keep a close eye on the pans because sugar can burn easily. Try different kinds of nuts or a mixture of leave you feeling satisfied longer nuts. Store in an airtight container

We can do better

Every once in a while I can't control myself and I write about education. Yesterday's news set me off again.

"Among 34 developed countries [plus 31 partner countries and independent economies], the United States ranked 26th in math, 21st in science and 17th in reading - none of them significantly different from previous PISA (Program for International Student Assessment) tests," I read in a news release.

You won't be surprised to know that the top country was Shanghai, followed by Singapore, Hong Kong, Taipei, South Korea, Macau, Japan, Liechtenstein, Switzerland and the Netherlands. And the United States ranked well below these. It would be easier to list the eight countries that ranked lower than we did, but at the very bottom were Qatar,

There's more bad news: "The United States had a below-average percentage of students in the top two performance levels of math, and more than one-quarter at the lowest level, a proportion that hasn't changed since 2003," according to the report. So, more than a quarter of our students who were tested fell into the lowest category of performance. And that hasn't changed in the past 10 years.

All this bad news is despite the fact that the U.S. \$115,000 annually per student, which is more than virtually any other country. Yet, our results are about the same as the Slovak Republic, which spends \$53,000

So, what's the deal? The author of the article, Sharon Noguchi, notes that the evidence doesn't support the contention that "our problem" is the diversity of students in America. Family backgrounds of students may be a factor, but other countries with similar populations have used the PISA results to improve their performance.

A very interesting sidebar from this analysis was that students around the world who attended preschool, scored 53 points higher in math than those who did not attend preschool. That's the equivalent of one year in school.

This was a big issue in the North Dakota Legislature this session.

Maybe my recollection is faulty, but it seems to me that the House Education Committee recommended the preschool bill not pass. But the full house went against that recommendation and it passed. One skeptical House member stated that it was just a subsidized babysitting program for parents - an alternative to day care. The Senate bill came out of committee with a do-pass recommendation, and I presume it passed in the full Senate. Nice going, gang.

It seems to me that all, or most, studies have shown the impressive benefits of that year of preschool, and this PISA study seems to sub-

Of course, there has been a long list of studies that have shown America's poor academic test results compared to other countries. So Bush comes up with No Child Left Behind. Obama comes up with Common Core. Teachers push back. Many of them don't want to change what they have been doing for decades. Legislators push back. Many feel that school should be just the way it was 50 years ago. See how

And politics raises its ugly head, Democrats pushing against OCLB and Republicans pushing against CC, regardless of their merits. So everything gets stuck in the mud, and year after year of kids have no alternative except to slog along in well-documented mediocrity.

As such, you're not likely to find many good places while searching electronic reports, because lots of other people are doing the same thing.

Your time is better spent out in the field, looking to discover your own secret spot, or establishing relationships that lead to access to private land.

Let's talk and talk about reservation problems

Over the next three years, we are going to do a lot of talking about problems on the Indian reservations.

As a member of the U.S. Senate Committee on Indian Affairs, Heidi Heitkamp has introduced legislation to create an 11-member, three-year Commission on Native Children.

Senator John Hoeven, and a number of other senators with large Indian constituencies, have joined Heitkamp on the proposal.

The panel would submit a report to Congress recommending ways to improve life for Indian children. Senator Heitkamp hopes this will produce a national plan for funding Indian education.

To do some fact-finding, Senator Heitkamp went to the Standing Rock Reservation south of Bismarck-Mandan. Accompanied by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Kirsten Baesler, she visited with tribal and school officials about the needs.

Tribal Council Member Jay Taken Alive was skeptical. If the commission is ever created and makes a report, he doubts that the federal government will ever provide the funds.

Then there is the 12-member advisory committee, co-chaired by former Senator Byron Dorgan, named by Attorney General Eric Holder, to study violence involving Indian children. When in office, Dorgan chaired the Senate Indian Affairs committee.

Dorgan is quoted as saying that "we've got a lot of Indian children in this country living in Third World conditions" and "it has to change."

Four hearings of the advisory committee were scheduled so more talking could be done.

While I think both of these study committees are worthwhile, I share Taken Alive's skepticism.

As lieutenant governor, I chaired the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission for Governor George Sinner for four years. We rotated monthly meetings among the four reservations.

The meetings were opportunities to hold the white man's feet to the fire. Tribal leaders could let off steam about the failure of the federal and state governments to honor the level of commitment to which Native-Americans were entitled.

So every month we would gather and talk about the problems. Because the state appropriations for Native-American programs were so meager, all we could do is talk. So we talked and we talked. We could N.D. Matters

do little else.

North Dakota now has money - a lot of money. But will that change our priorities so that some of this money will be used to finance gaps in federal programming? I'm skeptical.

Even though it is time for the state to assume some financial responsibility, in the past we have been too willing to neglect Indian problems, arguing that these were federal matters. That let us off the hook.

Our policy process is rigged against small minorities, regardless of the legitimacy of their complaints. Indians are a distinct minority in a political system that only responds to majorities or economic clout. So implementing plans by either the state or national government will be an uphill fight all the way.

And anyone who believes that problems on Indian reservations can be solved without money must also believe that the moon is made of

It was very appropriate for Superintendent Baesler to accompany Senator Heitkamp to Standing Rock. Her presence underscored the importance of education. Next to personal safety, an education system wrought with low attendance, dropouts and lack of academic discipline is the most critical problem for Native-American kids.

Education must have federal and state support, but it must also have tribal and parental support. Without that support, it isn't going to change.

So there will be a lot of talking over the next couple years about the problems in reservations. Let's hope it results in action.

"This law was an important step in protecting the health of all North Dakotans," said Brittany Long, with Wells County District Health Unit. "Everyone benefits from being able to breathe clean air in indoor workplaces and public places.'

According to Jeanne Prom, executive director of the Center, North Dakota's smoke-free law is an important piece of preventing tobacco use because it demonstrates the public's support for a tobacco-free lifestyle.

'The people of North Dakota

made it clear that the right choice is the healthy choice," said Prom. "Everyone should have the right to breathe clean air."

In addition to the immediate health benefits of smoke-free workplaces, the smoke-free law promotes a healthy lifestyle to children by making tobacco use a less acceptable practice.

"Research has shown that when communities enact smokefree laws, tobacco use becomes less appealing to children because it is perceived as less socially acceptable," said Long. "This is as important as ever because tobacco companies are turning to fruitflavored products to attract and addict our children.

James D. Plunkett, 80, Harvey formerly rural Bowdon, died Monday, Dec. 2, 2013, at a Bismarck hospital. The funeral will be Wednesday, Dec. 11, 11 a.m. at Trinity Bethany Lutheran Church, Harvey, with burial in Heaton Cemetery. Visitation one hour before service.

He was born Nov. 9, 1933, to Herbert and Vera Plunkett near Heaton. The family later moved to a farm near Bowdon. He began farming with his father at an early age, and later took over the farm.
