\$10,000 raised at Relay event

Tri-County Relay for Life hosted a cake auction fundraiser on Tuesday, Oct. 17. This is the ninth annual cake auction held in Harvey for breast cancer awareness.

More than \$10,000 was raised on auction items. "That's a record, for us," said Rita Weninger, committee member.

Twenty-seven cakes were decorated by businesses, organizations, and individuals.

Weninger explained that breast cancer is the most common cancer among American women. Overall, among men and women, breast cancer is the second most common cancer, with lung cancer

Judge rejects plea bargain

Johnny Z. Lawson, former sheriff of Wells County, appeared in Wells County District Court Thursday, Oct. 26, to request a plea bargain and to settle the criminal charges against him. His request was denied.

Though Lawson's defense attorney and the prosecutor for the state argued in support of the plea agreement, it was rejected by Southeast District Judge Daniel Narum.

"I don't think that the plea agreement serves justice," Narum said.

The plea agreement would have dismissed both felony charges and two misdemeanor charges in exchange for a plea of guilty to ingestion of a controlled substance. For the guilty plea, Lawson's attorney, Peter Welte, requested a sentence of five days in jail with credit for five days served.

"The other charges are not supported in fact. Not substantiated in fact," Welte said.

Jeremy Ensrud, special assistant attorney representing the State Attorney General's Office agreed.

He said, "The original charges are centered around Lawson's association with Alex Lail. The benefit of the plea agreement is that he has agreed to cooperate with the prosecution of Alex Lail."

Lail is facing numerous felony charges associated with drug conspiracy, corruption and criminal activity in and around Wells

County. He will appear in court in December.

"There's a big difference between probable cause and the state's burden to prove beyond a reasonable doubt. I think it would be an uphill battle to obtain a conviction on these charges," Ensrud said.

However, Narum appeared unconvinced.

"This is a significant price for the state to pay for [Lawson's] cooperation in this investigation," he said.

Narum then referenced an October 20 request from Brian Mindt, Cathay, to address the court.

"Despite reservations, I'm going to give Mindt the opportunity to come forward," Narum said. "I think you have the right to be heard with understanding that it may not be something I'm allowed to consider."

Mindt's statement, as well as additional statements from Donna Lail and Courtney Lemer, included examples of problems they had with Lawson. Then Lawson's wife and son, Chistine Lawson and Brandon Lawson, spoke in defense of Lawson and his duties as sheriff.

Christine said her husband had been "railroaded."

"There are multiple people in the courthouse who have been breaching information that was sealed," Brandon said.

After lengthy and silent consideration, Narum said, "I have two options. To accept the plea agreement as presented or to reject it." He rejected it.

In doing so, Narum said he considered the serious nature of the charges, the fact that the defendant was a public official, and the fact that two of the charges directly relate to his service as public official.

Welte requested an amended bond order to lift the travel restriction so that Lawson could seek employment and go on vacation. Narum denied this request, maintaining out-of-state travel restrictions to South Dakota and Montana.

Narum did approve a gag order against Wells County State's Attorney and employees and to all parties and witnesses associated

with the case.

On May 30, Lawson was arrested and charged with five counts - two felonies and three misdemeanors.

Count 1: Conspiracy to Deliver Meth (Class A Felony). Allegedly, Lawson agreed to deliver meth and was compensated for it.

Count 2: Bribery (Class B Felony). Allegedly, as Wells County Sheriff, Lawson received compensation of free meth for agreeing to violate duties.

Count 3: False Information to a Law Enforcement Office (Class A Misdemeanor). Allegedly, Lawson knowingly gave false information and reports to ND Bureau of Criminal Investigation.

Count 4: Neglect of Duty (Class A Misdemeanor). Allegedly, Lawson knowingly refused to perform duties to investigate and assist in the prosecution of laws regarding the use, possession, ingestion and delivery of methamphetamine. He allegedly received meth and willfully neglected to file reports relating to drugs, burglaries and conspiracy to commit armed robbery.

Count 5: Ingesting a Controlled Substance, Methamphetamine (Class A misdemeanor). Allegedly, between August 1, 2016 to April 19, 2017, Lawson admitted to intentionally ingesting meth by snorting.

His charges were for alleged criminal activity and conspiracy that occurred between January 1, 2016, and April 25, 2017, while he was a licensed peace officer serving as the sheriff of Wells County.

Five days after he was arrested, Lawson was released from jail, by ruling of Southeast Judicial District Judge Jay Schmitz, on a \$25,000 unsecured bond.

On June 28, he appeared before the court by telephone, requesting that his bond be modified to allow him to travel between North Dakota, South Dakota, and Montana. This was granted by Southeast District Judge Daniel Narum. Lawson's attorney argued that Lawson needed to travel across state lines so that he could maintain employment.

The food pantry in Harvey was located in the basement of First Lutheran Church, but five years ago, it moved next to the Harvey Ambulance Service bay. The pantry had operated in conjunction with Central Dakota Ministerial Association, but is now its own entity. Board members are President Dave Lutt, Kathy Grossman, Judy Frueh, Marshall Erickson, CDMA representative Pastor Danelle Olson, Lyndsey English, and the food pantry coordinator, Marilee Kline. The food pantry is a non-

profit organization, running on the help of donations from the community. Lutt and Kline said donations and fundraisers happen often but seem to go unnoticed. They agree this community provides extraordinary support for the pantry. Many churches, businesses, and organizations raise money and food every year for the pantry. Every November, churches pitch in to provide traditional Thanksgiving dinner food items, including a turkey for each family. Many volunteers help on distribution days which is the second Thursday of each month. The school organization FCCLA holds an annual Homeless Night and collects donations by going door to door. The Harvey FFA, FBLA, and the Lions Club hold food drives. Hinrichs SuperValu holds a Cherries for Charity event every year, CP Rail gives a dona-

tion, and First International Bank & Trust holds a Season of Giving event. More community members donate and hold fundraisers on a regular basis. Unit Office. Like Benson, she was also born in Washington state, although she moved to North Dakota as a child. She and her husband farm in rural Stutsman County, and she has lived in the area 17 years. Stolz said, "I continue with direct service to my clients and the programs that I manage and help with, but I'm also in a supporting role to the rest of the staff." Other duties include giving health-related presentations to schools and delivering nursing services to students. "We do things with dental month, screening programs, vision and health screenings, and lice checks; we provide the services because the schools don't have nurses," Stolz indicated. Wells County Public Health nurses also deliver some health services to residents who, while "well", need help to manage their own health care. "We support them. We work closely with social services and we work together to help people stay in their homes. Our job is to keep them in their own homes for as long as possible," Stolz noted. Other services include providing resources for environmental health, among a variety of other topics. "We provide resources for

medical services. We don't take them to the doctor, but we refer them to resources to get them to the doctor (the bus, rides, etc.) We have a lot of resources that they may not know about," Stolz noted. "We do the Health Trax program for 0-21 Medicaid patients. We also have WIC in our office now. People are surprised, because they used to have to go to Devils Lake to get those services, so they're glad to hear it's available here," she continued. Brittany Long, who has served as the director of the Wells County Health District for two years, attends classes in Grand Forks at the University of North Dakota's Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner program. Long said she is set to graduate from the program in May. "We'll continue to provide our services, but we're looking to expand to provide behavioral, substance abuse and mental health. We hope to collaborate with other agencies and providers to make our community a healthier and safer place to live in," she said. Long, a Sykeston native, came to the Harvey area in 2007, and she has worked in Public Health for five years. She lives with her husband and two daughters on their family farm near Bowdon.

drive process. The online AAA StartSmart program also offers great resources for parents on how to become effective in-vehicle coaches as well as advice on how to manage their teen's overall driving privileges. Teens preparing for the responsibility

of driving should enroll in a driver education program that teaches how to avoid driver distraction and other safety skills. AAA also offers membership discounts for new teen drivers to help keep them safe on the road in case of an emergency.

Martin Luther thought outside of the box

When Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses to the door at Wittenberg 500 years ago on October 31, he did not dream that he was starting a revolution that would reverberate throughout Christendom for centuries.

While he was gifted in a number of ways, his greatest asset was the ability to think outside of the box, rediscovering the centrality of Scripture for those who thought they were followers of Christ.

In his open letter to Pope Leo X, he alleged that "the Roman church, once the holiest of all, has become the most licentious den of thieves...and for three hundred years had ... a great increase of corruption and wickedness."

It was a brazen challenge for the most powerful institution of the time.

It seems that Luther was the last Christian who could think outside of the box. Most other reform denominations followed Luther's path but no one has really nailed 95 theses to the church door since 1517.

In fact, any folks who dared think outside of the box were burned at the stake as heretics by other true believing reformers,

all with the consent of the faithful. That certainly discouraged any other Lutherans from coming forward.

The magnitude of Luther's challenge has been muffled by the passage of time. But to appreciate his courage and discernment, let us conjure up a couple of comparable theses that would create the furor that Luther faced in 1517.

While we may not be able to think of 95 challenges for American Christianity, here are a few that would draw the wrath of the today's Christian church.

Thesis One: Christian churches, your members have abandoned the Gospel for the comforts and privileges of a secular culture. You have been secularized so that there is no longer any distinction between believers and nonbelievers.

Thesis Two: American Christian churches, your members have become a congregation of nation worshippers, glorying nationalism and all of its emblems and rituals. You were asked to honor and obey the king. But patriotism is one thing; adulation is idolatry.

Thesis Three: Christian churches, your members have forgotten

the needy and downtrodden. In the struggle between the "haves" and "have-nots" you have chosen the side of the "haves" against the "have nots" because you are now among the "haves."

Thesis Four: Christian churches, your members have become contentious and confrontational, bringing dishonor to Christ by their behavior. Christian universities now have law schools to escalate contentiousness with expertise. Unbelievers know better than Christians what Christians ought to be. They know a hypocrite when they see one.

Thesis Five: Christian churches, your members are anti-intellectual. They are afraid that inquiring minds will undermine their faith when all science can do is prove what God has done. Remember the stupidity of the church in dealing with Galileo. As Luther said: 'Heaven was not made for geese.'

So we have enraged today's believers with only five possible theses that would be as inflammable as the 95 Luther nailed to his Wittenberg door. But imagine what would happen if a Christian in the Luther tradition would stand in the back of the church and rail on the congregation to implement these theses.

"Sell your fine clothes, cars, homes and give it to the poor. Defend the 'have-nots.' Quit being contentious. Love everybody, including Jews, Moslems and African-Americans. Your bigotry is showing."

Well, the odds are pretty good that this troublemaker will not be welcome next Sunday.

So it has been 500 years since Luther put his life in danger by confronting the church. Maybe his work isn't done but it will probably be another 500 years before we see a theologian able to think outside of the box as Luther did.

Survey participation

Chance are, just about anyone who has hunted in North Dakota for more than a year or two has received a post-season survey from the State Game and Fish Department.

It doesn't happen every year, but perhaps every handful of years or so your name will come up in the random selection process that determines who gets a survey to provide information on how many birds or what deer they got, how many days they hunted, and where, among other things.

Most surveys go out right after a season closes so details are still fresh in a hunter's mind. With the state's small game and waterfowl hunting surveys, you get a draft survey prior to the season to basically help keep a running tally of how many and what kind of ducks or upland game you bagged, so it's right there at your fingertips when the official survey after the season.

Chad Parent, the Game and Fish Department's survey coord-

inator, was a recent guest on the agency's weekly webcast, OUT-DOORS Online, and provided some insight and background into the survey process.

Each hunting unit in the state has some biologically sustainable amount of harvest that a wildlife population can support. Knowing what is "sustainable" requires information on a couple of things, but importantly, the number of game animals removed from the population by harvest. We obtain this information by sending out surveys, and from those surveys we can get an estimate of harvest, we pass it along to biologists and they use that information in conjunction with other data that they collect to make decisions about how much and where do they put harvest in future hunting seasons.

Game and Fish sent out approximately 75,000 surveys last year between the initial surveys that go out, and then the follow-up reminders to hunters who

have not returned a survey. For the fall, that includes surveys for youth pheasant, waterfowl and deer, early Canada goose, all of the deer, pronghorn, elk, moose, bighorn sheep, fall turkey, upland game and waterfowl seasons. In the spring there are surveys for furbearer and spring turkey.

Game and Fish tries to make the surveys simple and easy to fill out, either on the paper form you get in the mail, or online. One important piece of information is where did you hunt and how many days did you spend hunting there. Another one is, were you successful, and if you were successful how many of that game species did you harvest.

Even the information that we get from unsuccessful hunters is important.

North Dakota's deer gun survey has been in place since 1975. What that big data set allows Game and Fish to do is to put into perspective some of the short term trends that might occur compared to 40 years worth of data.

All those harvest estimates that Game and Fish produces throughout the year are based on these surveys, so we urge all hunters who are selected to send in their information. The more surveys that come in, the better the data for all of us.

Do you believe in spooks?

Halloween, a good day for ghost stories, and North Dakota has no shortage of them. Legends have been floating around for years of the "Kindred Lights," the "Grim Reaper" in a Baptist church near Fredonia, the "Fatal Stump" near Belfield, and the "Gas Chamber" on the deserted Oss farmstead near Hatton.

In Grand Forks, in the Altru Hospital, a staff elevator seems to make unexpected runs on its own, stopping at routine floors on and off throughout the night. Custer's wife is said to haunt her former home at Fort Lincoln in Mandan, and at Fort Abercrombie, many believe they've seen the spirits of soldiers and Indians who died there.

The Liberty Memorial Building, on the grounds of the State Capitol, is said to be haunted by a ghost known as the "Stack Monster." The state historical society used to be located in the building, in which thousands of Indian and pioneer artifacts, skeletons, and old books were stored and displayed; it's thought that one of the items had a ghost attached. It's reported that voices, feelings of dread, unexplained shadows and footsteps affected workers there for years.

The Memory Gardens Cemetery east of Valley City has a floating orb known as the Blue Boy, and a cemetery near the State Hospital in Jamestown has

spawned stories of rattling gates, unexplained footsteps and sensations of being grabbed.

In a tunnel that connects UND's dining hall to five dorms, there have been several sightings of the ghost of a girl with short dark hair. It's said that in 1988, three students saw her and described her as about 5'5" tall and wearing a nightshirt. The apparition has been linked to the tragic death of a young woman who froze to death in 1962 when she was on her way to the dining hall in the middle of the night. It's believed she slipped

on the ice - this being before the tunnels were built.

A glowing cross can be seen at night in an empty church near Absaraka. Be forewarned, the locals aren't happy to have curious folks poking around their community at night - which is understandable. But those who have managed to see the image describe a glowing cross that hovers in mid-air within the sanctuary, and that no matter what angle you view it from, it's always a front-on view. The cross cannot be seen from inside the church, only by looking through

the windows, which are by some accounts boarded up... or not. The locals have explained that the cross is nothing more than the result of light passing through a special feature in the window glass; but that's not much fun.

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Twenty years of Prairie Fare

The column has covered
topics from apples to zucchini

"What would you think about writing a weekly column?" a couple of editors from the NDSU Extension Service asked me.

"What if no papers run it?" I responded.

"Oh, they will," they replied in unison. "Writing something new every week can get to be a grind, though," one of them added.

I had a toddler son who didn't always sleep all night, I was fairly new to my career and I was adjusting to the recent loss of my mother. I wasn't sure about adding to my plate.

However, the editors detected something in me. I wanted to be a writer from the time I was a young girl barely able to hold a pencil.

So I agreed. Next, we had to come up with a name for the column. "Prairie" came easily, but we needed a second word. We looked up some synonyms for food. And that's how "Prairie Fare" was born 20 years ago.

That adds up to 1,040 columns and 875,000 words, give or take.

In the beginning, Dean Hulse, one of the editors, was my co-writer. He wrote the introduction and added a recipe inspired by his training in culinary arts. For the first couple of years, I responded to the question, "What's your take on this, Julie?" That was easy.

Then Dean went back to college for an advanced writing degree. By this time, my husband and I had added a daughter to our family, so I wasn't getting enough sleep again. Sometimes I was parked in front of the computer writing late on Wednesday night for my Thursday morning deadline. Five years later, our third child arrived, and then we added three dogs a few years later.

Inspiration has come from many places, including our dogs. People ask me questions about food. I read articles in scientific literature, I go to conferences, and I watch food shows and read popular magazines. I keep a notebook handy and jot down ideas. The best ideas always come from my life experiences, usually unexpectedly.

Family members have inspired hundreds of columns. They are a patient bunch. Sometimes, at the dinner table, my kids have begun to verbally "write" a column for me, ending with "my daughter said" or "my son said." That ploy has never worked. Then they catch a certain gleam in my eye as I observe a situation. They shake their heads at me.

Through the years, I have covered topics from apples to zucchini and everything in between. You may think that we in the nutrition field can't make up our mind about foods such as butter, salt and eggs. Although scientific studies with surprising results sometimes make the news, recommendations are based on many years of peer-reviewed scientific research. Nutrition recommendations evolve as more research is published.

A few nuggets I have gleaned: Be careful where you get your information about nutrition, food safety and health. Not everything we read is backed by science. Anyone can blog or tweet whatever he or she would like to say. In the Extension system, we pride ourselves on providing research-based information.

Eat more vegetables and fruits of all colors. More people short-change themselves on vegetables and fruits than any of the other

food groups.

Eat breakfast to fuel your body and brain and help maintain or lose weight.

Eat more fiber. Beans, lentils and peas, along with vegetables and fruits, are excellent fiber sources.

Balance your plate with foods from each of the five food groups. Besides fruits and vegetables, be sure to have lean protein, a calcium source such as milk or yogurt, and grain foods, especially whole grains.

Practice moderation. All foods can fit in a healthful diet, but you have to watch portions.

Get some exercise on most days. Adults need at least 30 minutes of physical activity and kids need 60 minutes.

Remember beverage calories count. You may rethink your drink.

Pumpkin Bread Pudding

1 c. low-fat milk
3/4 c. sugar
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1 (15-ounce) can pumpkin, mashed (not pie filling)
2 1/2 c. stale bread cubes, cut small
1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
2 Tbsp. brown sugar

Preheat oven to 350 F. Remove crust from bread and cut into small cubes. In medium-size bowl, combine milk, sugar, eggs, salt, vanilla and pumpkin; blend thoroughly. Stir in bread cubes. Pour into greased 1 1/2-quart baking dish. Bake 35 to 40 minutes. While pudding is baking, combine brown sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle mixture on top of pudding. Return pudding to the oven and bake for about 10 minutes more.

For added fiber, consider using whole-grain white bread or similar product.

Makes 6 servings. Each serving has 220 calories, 3 grams (g) fat, 6 g protein, 43 g carbohydrate, 3 g fiber and 320 milligrams sodium.

Watch for fake Publishers Clearing House scam

Scammers, using the Publishers Clearing House name, are trying to trick people into believing that their dreams are about to come true because they have won the sweepstakes.

Elderly individuals living alone are favorite targets of scam artists. In the past 12 months, elderly North Dakota victims have lost more than \$366,000 to sweepstakes scams, according to the North Dakota Attorney General's office.

Scammers are saying in order to receive your prize you will need to send money to cover "fees and taxes." Paying to collect a prize is a scam. Every time. Scammers will often ask you to send them money from Western Union or MoneyGram, or buy a gift card or prepaid card. If money is sent in one of these ways, it is nearly impossible to track and you can almost guarantee you will never get that money back.

If you are asked to pay anything at all before you receive any prize, it is a scam. No legitimate

sweepstakes require a winner to pay fees or taxes up front before the prize money is disbursed.

Did you send money to a scammer, or know someone who has? Report the loss to the company you paid through (Western Union, MoneyGram, or the prepaid or gift card company). And then report it to the North Dakota Attorney General's office.

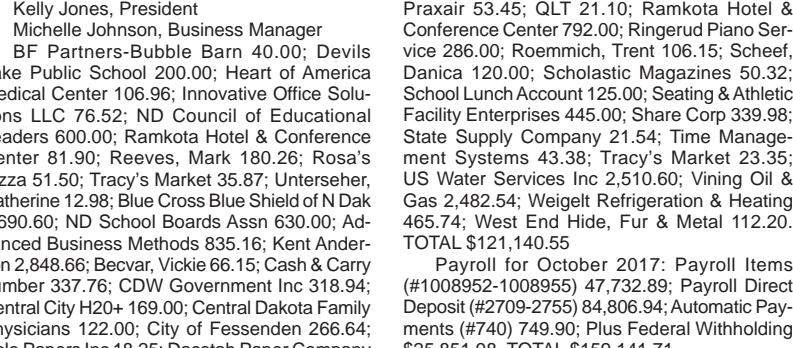

Feed My Starving Children event coming to Maddock

Every year thousands of people join forces to pack meals for those starving in other parts of the world. For the second year in a row, residents of Maddock and surrounding communities are joining the effort.
November 17-18, volunteers will gather at the Benson County Events Center with the hope of packing 100,000 meals as part of the Feed My Starving Children (FMSC) initiative.
Barb Rice is serving as chairperson of the Maddock event. She heard about FMSC when she attended a wedding in Minneapolis. One of the scheduled events was a family outing to pack meals.
She said the event is well-organized and works similar to an assembly line. Twelve people are assigned to each packing station and they compete with other teams.
"There's music playing, it's very upbeat," Rice said. "They make it so fun to be able to serve and help someone."
Rice was so inspired that she wanted to bring the effort to her hometown but soon found it was more work than anticipated.
"We need 500 volunteers and \$22,000 to host it," she said. "It seemed a little overwhelming."
Rice found help in friends from church. Seven friends accompanied her to Grand Forks to pack meals during a similar event and they came back to Maddock and formed a committee.
They sent letters to churches

and volunteers visited businesses. They also contacted local organizations such as 4-H and FFA. A large number of volunteers have agreed to help pack food and donations have been arriving.
"We prayed about it and it started coming in," she said. "We just hope it continues to do that."
The event would be a good activity for youth groups and clubs and a good way for people to do something extraordinary.
"We have so much in our country and people are starving in other countries," she said.
The FMSC program sends the volunteer-packed nutritious meals to 70 countries, where they are distributed at orphanages, schools, clinics and other food pantry programs. The meals are specifically formulated for malnourished children.
Committee member Diane Randle said the meals contain rice, vegetables, and a protein, and are sealed with a label and expiration date. The recipient must only add water to have a complete meal.
"It's one way to help," Randle said. "You volunteer a couple of hours and help someone who really needs it."



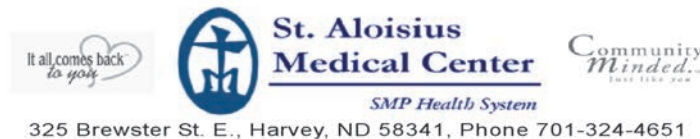
